

**Ornamental Native Tree Species suitable for growing in the  
Holroyd Local Government Area (LGA)**

- This Native Tree List should assist you in selecting a new tree for your property.
- As per the requirements of most approved applications, you will be required to plant one or more new trees within the confines of your property or on Council's naturestrip.
- The 'Replacement Tree Planting Slip' is to be returned to Council indicating that the required replacement tree or trees have been planted.

WHITE SALLOW WATTLE (Pale Yellow flowers)	ACACIA FLORIBUNDA (July – Nov)	5 m	Small tree suitable for screening
SYDNEY GREEN WATTLE (Pale yellow flowers)	<b>ACACIA PARRAMATTENSIS</b> (Nov – Feb)	10 m	Quick growing endemic tree suitable for screening
BLUISH SATINASH (Small white flowers)	ACMENA HEMILAMPRA (Dec – Jan)	8 – 10 m	Flushes of new pink growth
LILLY PILLY (Small cream white flowers)	<b>ACMENA SMITHII</b> (Dec – Jan)	8 m	Glossy green leaves; Flushes of new pink growth
DWARF LILLY PILLY (Creamy white flowers)	ACMENA SMITHII var MINOR (Dec – Jan)	5 – 6m	Small Screen tree; Flushes of new pink growth
ROUGH BARKED APPLE (Creamy white flowers)	ANGOPHORA FLORIBUNDA (Oct – Dec)	10 – 15 m	Attractive Feature Tree with rough textured bark
LEMON SCENTED MYRTLE (White flowers)	BACKHOUSIA CITRIODORA (Dec – Mar)	10 m	Attractive Shade & Screen Tree
GREY MYRTLE (White flowers; perfumed)	<b>BACKHOUSIA MYRTIFOLIA</b> (Oct – Jan)	8 m	Attractive Shade & Screen Tree

HEATH-LEAVED BANKSIA (Orange flowers)	BANKSIA ERICIFOLIA (May – Aug)	5 m	Slow Growing; bird attracting; large shrub to small tree
HONEYSUCKLE BANKSIA (Creamy white/ yellow flowers)	BANKSIA INTEGRIFOLIA (Jan - June)	8 m	Silvery underside to foliage; Bird attracting.
ILLAWARRA FLAME TREE * (Red flowers)	BRACHYCHITON ACERIFOLIUS (Dec - Jan)  *Note: Some Illawarra Flame Trees can be deciduous in Sydney	10 m	Bird attracting; dark glossy leaves; drought tolerant; good shade tree.
KURRAJONG (Creamy white flowers)	BRACHYCHITON POPULNEUS (Nov - Jan)	12 m	Shapely tree with stout trunk & dense leafy canopy; good shade tree.
IVORY CURL FLOWER (Creamy white flowers)	BUCKINGHAMIA CELSISSIMA (Jan – April)	6 m	Feature tree with large creamy white hanging flowers. Attract nectar eating birds
CRIMSON BOTTLEBRUSH (Red flowers)	<b>CALLISTEMON CITRINUS</b> (Sept – Dec)  C. ‘Endeavor’	4 - 6 m	Fast growing tree with lemon scented leaves
WILLOW BOTTLEBRUSH (Creamy yellow flowers; Pink flowering also available)	CALLISTEMON SALIGNUS (Sept - Dec)	6 – 8 m	Weeping Paperbark tree; very hardy suitable for screening; bird attracting.
BOTTLEBRUSH VARIETIES (Red flowers)	CALLISTEMON VIMINALIS (Sept – Dec)  C. ‘King’s Park Special’; C. ‘Harkness’, C. ‘Dawson River’, C. ‘Hannah Ray’	4 – 6 m	Weeping branches & bright red flowers that attract parrots and nectar eating birds; drought tolerant
PORT JACKSON PINE (no significant flowers)	CALLITRIS RHOMBOIDEA	10 m	Conical shaped tree with dark green foliage; fast growing & bird attracting
BLUEBERRY ASH (Creamy white flowers)	ELAEOCARPUS RETICULATUS (Oct – Jan)	6 – 8 m	Attractive fringed creamy white flowers with brilliant blue berries
BLUEBERRY ASH (Pink flowers)	ELAEOCARPUS RETICULATUS (Oct – Jan)  E. ‘Prima Donna’	6 – 8 m	Attractive fringed pink flowers with brilliant blue berries

PINK-FLOWERED WHITE IRONBARK (Pink flowers)	EUCALYPTUS LEUCOXYLON 'Rosea' (June - Sept)	10 –15 m	Feature/ shade smooth bark tree. Birds, esp. parrots are feed on the flowers' nectar.
GRAFTED (Western Australian) RED FLOWERING GUM TREE (Red flowers; also available in white, orange or crimson)	CORYMBIA FICIFOLIA 'Summer Red' or 'Summer Beauty'. 'Dwarf Orange' & 'Dwarf Crimson' 'Wildfire' (Dec – Mar)	5– 6 m	Very popular Feature Tree with large spectacular flowers that attract parrots. Suitable for smaller gardens.
MUGGA IRONBARK GUM (Pink flowers)	<b>EUCALYPTUS SIDEROXYLON</b> (April - Oct)	15 m	Feature Tree; Black bark on trunk; pink to red flowers; Attracts parrots.
NATIVE FRANGIPANI (Yellow flowers)	HYMENOSPORUM FLAVUM (Oct – Nov)	10 m	Beautiful upright rainforest tree; dark green foliage & fragrant flowers
WHITE CLOUD TREE (Creamy white flowers)	<b>MELALEUCA DECORA</b> (Oct - Dec)	8 – 9 m	Handsome medium paperbark tree
SNOW-IN-SUMMER (White flowers)	MELALEUCA LINARIIFOLIA (Oct - Dec)	5 – 6 m	Handsome small paperbark tree
PRICKLY LEAVED PAPERBARK (White flowers)	<b>MELALEUCA STYPHELIODES</b> (Oct – Dec)	6 m	Handsome small paperbark tree`
MOCK OLIVE (Small pale yellow flowers)	<b>NOTOLAEA LONGIFOLIA</b> (May - Oct)	8 m	Hardy tree with weeping branches; decorative fruit, bird attracting
DIAMOND LAUREL (Small white flowers)	<b>PITTIOSPORUM RHOMBIFOLIUM</b> (Nov - Dec)	6 - 8 m	Upright tree; dark green dense foliage; perfumed flowers and bright orange berries.
SCRUB BEEFWOOD (Greenish-white flowers)	STENOCARPUS SALIGNUS (Oct – Jan)	8 - 10m	Slow Growing Feature Tree; bird attracting;
FIREWHEEL TREE (Brilliant Red flowers)	STENOCARPUS SINUATUS (Feb - Mar)	10 m	Slow Growing Feature Tree; dark green foliage; bird attracting;

SCRUB CHERRY (Small white flowers)	SYZYGIUM AUSTRALE 'Hunchy' (Sept – Dec)	4 - 5 m	Small Screen tree; Flushes of new pink growth
CHERRY SATINASH (White flowers)	SYZYGIUM LUEHMANNII (Oct – Dec)	8 – 10 m	Popular rainforest tree with glossy leaves and flushes of new pink growth
WATER GUM (Yellow flowers)	TRISTANIOPSIS LAURINA (Dec – Jan)	6 m	Attractive feature/ shade tree with dark green foliage
WEeping LILLY PILLY (Creamy white flowers)	WATERHOUSEA FLORIBUNDA (Nov – Dec)	10 – 12 m	Large attractive shade tree with dark green foliage

- Trees marked in **bold** are endemic to the local area of Holroyd.
